1. Describe and quantify the global health problem you will address (400 characters).
2. Indicate in one or two sentences what your bold idea is and how it will solve the global health problem that you identified. (This information will be made public) (250 characters)
3. Why is your idea unconventional or creative? How is it an improvement over current approaches? (700 characters)
4. Describe in detail how you plan to make your bold idea work. Please highlight the basis of your idea (what you plan to do, how you plan to do it, why you are doing it, where you plan to do it and who will be involved). Include methodology, and new technologies, models / approaches or policies to be developed. Although not required, references to other literature can be included to justify your approach. (2000 characters)
5. How does your idea integrate scientific/technological, social and business innovation - Integrated Innovation? For example, if your idea is based on a technological or scientific development please explain your plan for addressing the social and business aspects that are required to bring this innovation to scale (e.g. business planning, community engagement, policy-maker engagement, understanding end-user demand, distribution, integration within existing platforms, etc.). (300 characters)
6. Please describe the activities with their associated costs and break them down within the 12-18 month time period of the project allocated for the initial Phase I award (200 characters)
